EAST TOWN CROWNING GLORY FOR Red, White, and Blue Vision

Notice anything new in East Town? Cruise down North Avenue, and give a salute to the new flag banners dressing up the street.

East Town's new flag banners were first put up in May and cap the dream of former Wauwatosa alderman Dick Bachman. For nearly nine years, Bachman has walked up and down North Avenue, asking businesses and residents to donate to his cause—to dress North Avenue in red, white and blue.

The beginning of Bachman's dream actually started a number of years earlier, when he and his wife, Gloria used to plant one thousand little flags in North Avenue's median strip between 115th and 124th streets. It was their tradition every Memorial Day, July 4th and Labor Day.

"When we would be putting the flags in the median, people driving by would roll down their windows and shout 'Look's great!' or they'd blow their horns," says Bachman. "It made you feel good going out there."

The momentum kept building. After 9-11, Bachman felt the need for a more permanent and widespread placement for the flags. The city of Wauwatosa and Bachman soon came to an agreement. The Department of Public Works would mount the flags and take them down, but Bachman would have to provide the flags and the money for upkeep and replacement.

That's why, three months out of the year, Dick Bachman walks up and down North Avenue, seeking support for his flags. Bachman says he's been in every business between 60th and 124th streets.

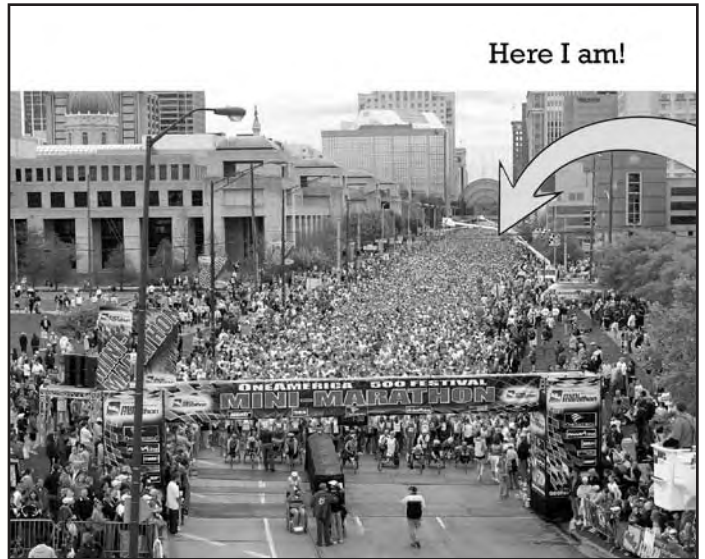

The first set of flags went up between Mayfair Road and 124th Street, followed by the stretch between 76th and 92nd streets, and Mayfair Road and 92nd. Today there are 160 flags along North Avenue, and the 110 East Town flag banners crown his efforts.

However, Bachman says his mission is far from over. Bachman says he'll be 79-years-old this September and would like to know that the flags and banners will be taken care of for years to come.

Every September, after the Department of Public Works takes down the flags, Bachman examines each one. He determines how many need to be replaced or repaired. He says the life of a flag usually lasts two to three years. However, the banners in East Town should last longer.

After a bad storm, Bachman is out on North Avenue assessing the damage. He says they typically lose four or five flags a year. People will just pick them up and take them. Although, more residents are starting to call him to report a flag they've found lying in the street.

If you would like to donate to the flag account, you should write your check out to the City of Wauwatosa. In the memo indicate "Flag Account."

"Last year was a bad year for the flags because of wind damage," says Bachman. It cost \$1100 for the replacement of flags.

A special flag account has been set up, and Bachman hopes to see it grow. Bachman says the hardest part of his project is raising money. Bachman says one year he sent out 1500 letters to businesses asking for support. Only 200 replied.

"It's disheartening to walk all day and get nothing," he says.

Bachman is very grateful to the businesses and the residents who have donated. Flag Center in Wauwatosa supplies all the flags and banners. It has also been a faithful donor.

Bachman also wants to thank Beth Jaworski of Shorewest. "East Town wouldn't have the banners without her." He says Jaworski donated \$2500 for the banners and also \$1000 for the flags.

If you would like to donate to the flag account, you should write your check out to the City of Wauwatosa. In the memo indicate "Flag Account."

"If every citizen in Wauwatosa would send in \$1, that would raise \$40,000," says Bachman. That would keep Tosa's flags and banners flying for years to come.



Salute to Dick Bachman

It's been said there are two loves in Dick Bachman's life. The first is his wife, Gloria and his family. The second is Wauwatosa. You can see Bachman's love for Tosa stretched the length of Tosa's North Avenue in the 160 flags and the 110 flag banners planted there.

The flag project is just one of many Dick Bachman efforts. For decades, Bachman, with the support of his wife, has served Wauwatosa. Bachman has worked tirelessly as an alderman and a volunteer in numerous groups including Tosa for Kids, Wauwatosa Baseball League, and Hart Park Senior Center. Bachman has established Tosa's civic celebrations and since 1973, has organized the 4th of July Civic Celebration and Parade.

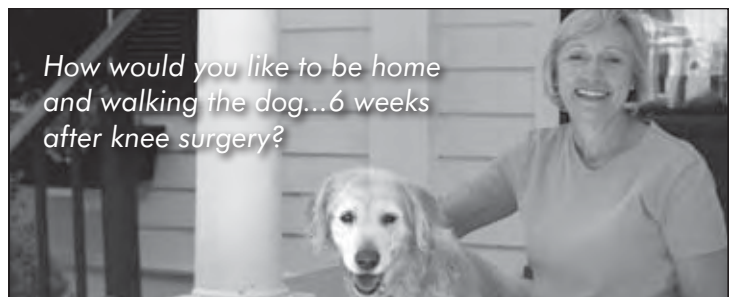

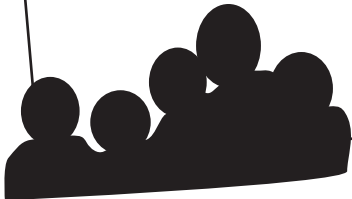


Movie Night in the Park

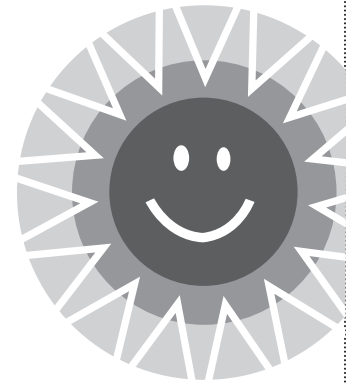

But we also see what good can happen when a community pulls together and helps a family through difficult times.

Children's Service Society of Wisconsin in partnership with the Bureau of Milwaukee Child Welfare is working to make connections in the community. Smart Energy: NOT JUST WINDMILLS AND SOLAR PANELS

Though not as visually compelling as windmills or solar panels, energy efficiency has the potential to be the workhorse of any plan to fight global warming, and to improve investors' bottom line.

Growing interest in energy efficiency technologies, like smart meters to help lower energy use in homes and businesses, will help ensure that the energy coming from those windmills and solar panels is put to wise use.

Most of us won't be able to site a wind tower or have the financial resources to add solar to our homes. We can contribute to reducing green house gases by improving the energy efficiency of our homes and our transportation choices.

A smart and cheap way to start is by looking at the energy usage of your home. You can do your own energy assessment easily by going to www.energystar.gov. Click on home improvement. There is a tool called the Yardstick that you can use to quickly get an idea of how you are doing. You will need to go to the WE Energies website to get information on your homes usage of electricity and natural gas if you are a WE Energies customer. WE Energies also has some tools you can use to evaluate your energy usage. In my case, using the Yardstick, I found that I scored 6.8 on a scale of 10 with 10 being the most energy efficient and 5 being the average. Suggestions given for making improvements included seal air leaks in your home, seal leaks in your ductwork, add more insulation to your home, consider replacing your heating and cooling (HVAC) equipment, consider installing an ENERGY STAR qualified water heater, consider ENERGY STAR qualified windows when replacing, replace your lights with ENERGY STAR qualified lighting, install a programmable thermostat. Look for ENERGY STAR qualified products.

The incentive to making improvements now is that homeowners can claim a one-time 30% tax credit of up to \$1,500 for the years 2009 and 2010 combined. The home improvement tax credits for windows, skylights, insulation and exterior doors, metal and asphalt roofs, furnaces and boilers, central air conditioners, heat pumps and water pumps, and air-circulating fans apply to improvements installed from January 1, 2009 through December 31, 2010. All improvements must be installed in or on the taxpayer's principal residence in the United States. More information is available at the Focus on Energy website. Focus on Energy also offers some cash back rewards (www.focusonenergy.com).

New Home Energy Efficiency Program

Many of us are concerned about the high cost of energy and the effect on our home budget. Some of us are also concerned about total use of energy in our communities and the effect on our national budget and on climate change. Consider assisting your neighborhood association by developing a program to help members deal with these concerns.



A Home Energy Efficiency program works with individual home owners in reducing their energy consumption. This program will be based on the success of similar groups in other places.

The first step is to form Home Energy Efficiency work groups that will have their own meetings. In other settings, similar groups met every two weeks for six sessions to work on their program. Each meeting has a different topic such as: Energy Conservation; Water Conservation, Trash Reduction, Transportation, etc. Some groups get into other topics of common interest such as Nutrition. At each meeting, material is presented on the designated topic with take-home information and assignments. Group members also report on what they have accomplished based on the previous sessions project.

Using energy more efficiently in Wauwatosa and increasing our use of renewable energy will save consumers money, reduce green house gas emissions and create green jobs.

To get started:

- *Replace standard light bulbs with Compact Fluorescent Lamps (CFLs) These new lamps use 75% less energy than the lamps they replace and last many times longer.*
- *When replacing appliances, look for ENERGY STAR models. They use less energy to do the same job.*
- *When cooking, use a microwave oven rather than a conventional oven. This will save time, reduce the energy used for a cooking job, and reduce the heat released into your kitchen.*

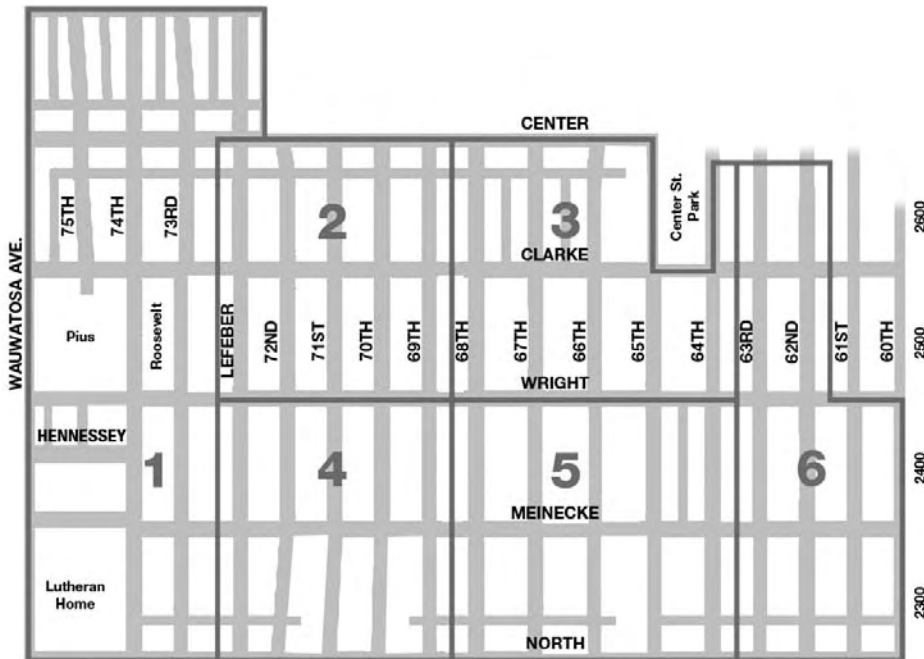
